

If your source does not offer a full citation, you will have to piece one together yourself from the information offered on the website. Unfortunately, there is no set rule for the organization of websites; therefore, you may have to scroll around quite a bit in order to find the given information to build your citation. Do not be surprised if you do not have all of the parts discussed below.

(skip if not given)

article title (or individual page)
enclosed in quotes

in *italics*,
(underlined if hand-written)

version or edition
(leave out if not given)

(if it differs from name of website)

date of publication or posting
(give year only if that is all you are provided)

***DO NOT INCLUDE** http://, https:// or angle brackets with the URL! A DOI (digital object identifier) may be used in place of the URL if that is given instead.

An access date (the date you looked at the site) is optional but belongs last in the citation if included: **Accessed 26 July 2015.**
