Course Title: AP Studio Art

Description: AP Studio Art is an intensive course that addresses advanced concepts in one of the three areas of the student choice drawing/painting, 2-D, or 3-D. This class has a strong emphasis on critical and analytical thinking. Students are expected to perform at an advanced skill level and take initiative to develop their own personal voice. Students taking this course are expected to produce portfolios consisting of a minimum of 24 pieces that can be used in the college admissions process and for advanced placement evaluation.

Goals: Students will

- produce 12 artworks relating to a visual theme for the concentration section of the AP Portfolio.
- create, evaluate, and select a group of 12 pieces that demonstrate a variety of concepts media and approaches in their selected area for the Breadth section of the AP Portfolio.
- demonstrate mastery of 2-D Design/3-D Design/or drawing in concept, composition and execution in the Quality section of their portfolio.
- engage in a substantial amount of outside work both in the summer and during the school year to complete the amount of work that is require for this course.
- engage in in-depth critiques.
- read critical and art historical selections and write reviews and statements about their work, other work, and masters work.
- photograph artwork for preparing the AP Portfolio for submission.
- be required to submit their completed portfolios to AP central by May 1.
- design and curate the annual art show that includes a special exhibition highlighting their achievements.

Requirements: Students will

- develop a portfolio consisting of three sections:
 - 5 Quality
 - 12 Concentration
 - 12 Breadth
- develop good work ethic.
- develop their own vision in art.
- maintain a sketchbook.
- engage in critiques.
- display work.
