Description of Course: The third year program of Latin focuses upon advanced grammar, vocabulary, and syntax, culminating in the reading of passages adapted from the tale of *Jason and the Argonauts* and the *de Bello Gallico* of Julius Caesar Students will use the linguistic foundations already established in the earlier levels to translate demanding passages from these works, to analyze their content and format, and to appreciate their lasting value. Special emphasis will be placed upon the relationship between the literature and the political and social tone of the era.

Course Title: Latin III

Goals: The primary goal will be to build a strong foundation in the more advanced levels of Latin grammar, vocabulary, and syntax. At the same the student will explore the culture and mindset of the classical world and will draw comparisons with those of today. Through the reading about Caesar and his exploits in Gaul the student will also gain valuable insight into both the military life of Rome and the many talents and contributions of Julius Caesar.

A secondary goal will be to explore the world of classical mythology through the story of Jason and the Golden Fleece.

Requirements: Successful completion of Latin II.
