Course Title: Painting I

Description: Students taking painting will solve visual arts problems using a variety of basic media and techniques. Experiences will include drawing, acrylic and other water-base media painting. The student electing this course shall have taken either 2-D Foundations of Drawing and Painting or 2-D Foundations of Design and Computer Art and earned a C or better.

Goals: Students will

- select media, techniques, and processes; and intentionally take advantage of the qualities and characteristics of these media, techniques, and processes in order to enhance communication of experiences and ideas.
- select and use the qualities of structures and functions of art to improve communication of their ideas.
- integrate visual, spatial, and temporal concepts with content to communicate intended meaning in their art works.
- use subjects, themes, and symbols that demonstrate knowledge of contexts, values, and aesthetics that communicate intended meaning in art works.
- know and compare the characteristics of art works in various eras and cultures by viewing original art works as well as reproductions.
- analyze, describe, and demonstrate how factors of time and place influence visual characteristics that give meaning and value to a work of art.
- reflect upon and assess the characteristics and merits of their work and the work of others by comparisons of intent; and by analysis of contemporary and historic meanings in specific art works through cultural and aesthetic inquiry.
- · consider technology a means of design.
- explore careers in the arts.

Requirements: Students will

- maintain a sketchbook
- improve their work habits
- participate in individual and class critiques
- design and create paintings, which exhibit a knowledge of art structure and function
- express ideas by using painting media, techniques, and processes
- display finished works
- research assigned textual material in the library or on the interest.
